Phill Mintram at the memorial bench dedicated to his parents People walking on the path around the lake may have noticed a new bench near the children's playground bearing the inscription "M. R. Mintram and A. A. Mintram - Rest in peace". This bench has been provided by Phillip Mintram in memory of his parents, Millicent Rose and Albert Arthur Mintram.

Rose and Albert Mintram hailed originally from Old Woking but spent much of their lives in Maybury where they raised their family. Albert died around 1990 and in 1999 Rose moved to Bainton Mead in Goldsworth Park where she lived for the next 10 years before she, too, passed away.

Phill described them as wonderful parents and said that he wanted to create a lasting memorial that would be more pleasant to visit than the usual plaque at St Johns Crematorium. A bench in lovely spot on the lake bank was the answer and a redundancy payment last year enabled him to realise his wish. He hoped that visitors to the lake would be able to enjoy this tribute to his loving parents for many years to come.

Phill, who had not visited Goldsworth Park for some while, said that he was very impressed by the improvements to the lake; it was all much greener and there was less litter than he remembered.

He wanted to record his thanks to Nick Roach at Woking Borough Council, who had helped with the planning and to Earth Anchors who had made and installed the bench.

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County Council Report

County Councillor for Knaphill and Goldsworth West

The civic year starts in May, straight after the local elections. In Woking a third of Woking Borough Council seats are 'up' each year for three years, but next year there are 'all up' County Council elections, when everyone who wants to go on being a County Councillor has to fight for their seat.

This makes a difference to the pace of and tone of political business. The party in power will be focused on achievements and good news stories, while in the opposition we find ourselves increasingly focusing on evidence of failure and lost opportunities.

As usual, I must thank you as tax-payers for the formal 'Surrey County Council AGM Luncheon' after Full Council early in May, with poached salmon, fresh strawberries, and a 'local Surrey cheeseboard'. I'm glad to say that your hospitality is being much less tested than in my early years as a County Councillor. Alcoholic drinks are no longer served during working hours, so now we had a very pleasant fruit drink instead of wine. And even this level of service and fancy food is no longer a frequent occurrence.

Jobs for the girls

The 'Annual Meeting' is when Committee places are allocated, along with positions such as Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs. Places on Select Committees have to be allocated proportionally to the strength of political parties, but positions of responsibility do not. At one time opposition members held some of these positions, but the current administration has kept them exclusively for the Conservatives.

This power of patronage is a powerful tool in developing political skills - for example Linda Kemeny, elected County Councillor for St. Johns and Brookwood in a by-election less than a year ago, became Vice Chairman of the Adult Social Care Committee, and I suspect will go further. ('Adult Social Care' may not sound significant, but Surrey spends about six times as much on the old and the vulnerable

The Chairmanship of the Council is always held by a Conservative. Lavinia Sealy was reappointed this year. I generally have a great deal of respect for Lavinia's sincerity, intelligence, and benevolence, but her summary of 'what was important in the last year' was framed around royal visits, from the major royals downward, and 'as always, we had the Duke of Kent coming to an enormous number of things.

Money for what matters to us

Maybe I'm the one out of step. In the March SCC Woking Local Committee meeting I was the only Councillor to be disconcerted by the bid for £2,700 from Horsell Residents Association for a Jubilee Street Party of which, for example, £350 was for historical research and IT. I think my objections seemed petty to other Councillors. However the GPCA has given up the idea of a celebratory Jubilee 'Big Picnic' around the lake for lack of support, so maybe I'm not entirely out of line with opinion in our area.

If you're part of an organization that has a good idea for a project to 'promote the social, economic or environmental well being of the people of Woking', please contact me for the criteria and an application form. We've got £12,615 for each County Councillor plus £35,000 capital for the Committee to allocate before next April

Lakers Again

I took Nick Wilson, Surrey's 'Strategic Director for Children Schools and Families' to Lakers at the end of May. Members of the Corporate Leadership Team are each linked to a number of County Councillors, so that we can show them the good and the bad of Surrey services at ground level. Woking YMCA is supposed to have been running centre-based youth work there

We had a good discussion with Hannah Addison, their Development Officer, who said a new youth worker for Lakers has been appointed, but has still to move to Surrey. Nor are the needed part-time workers in place. For the moment, Surrey's own Youth Worker, Rebecca Wain, is still running some sessions at Lakers instead of moving, as planned, to Surrey County Council's Youth Support Service.

New arrangements for Lakers should include an advisory steering group with a range of people from the community, including young people, to allow their input. It should also make it easier to get information back to you.

As a lasting legacy to the Games and the project, each carefully crafted sculpture will be returned to the participating schools and displayed for future generations to enjoy and mark the events.

bailiffs appointed by Woking Borough Council to oversee fishing, monitor fish stocks and other wildlife, and keep the area generally clean and tidy.



Planting marginals

From mid April through to the end of May, we have been very busy at the lake-side planting thousands of new plants ranging from bluebell, primrose, cowslip and great willow herb on the banks to an array of marginals within the wildlife area as well as on the island and along parts of the south bank. Some of the more delicate plants, you will note, have been temporarily fenced off to protect them from grazing birds. We are also reintroducing broad leafed pond weed. This sub-aquatic once flourished here, with its spear shaped leaves and pretty pink spire-like flowers forming rafts much loved by dragon flies and damsel flies. It may take a year or so before we know if it has taken; fingers crossed that it will.

appeared round the lake. We had some 22 tons of soil brought round from near the hockey pitches. However, all but one hill has now gone. Some parts of the bank had been under cut and needed back filling to create a growing medium for the new plants. Once established, the roots will help to cut down on further erosion whilst adding to the habitat already achieved. I'm glad we got it done before the hot spell – digging in that heat doesn't appeal!

Despite spring being a washout lake the weather-wise, surrounding area has played host to many nesting birds - broods of coots, moorhens and ducks everywhere. Tens of thousands of tadpoles line the margins along with shoals of fish fry, all setting out on the adventure of life.



As for our resident pair of swans, there is no news yet of whether they have successfully raised any cygnets this year but, if they do return with a new family, battle is sure to ensue. At present, there no less than NINE yearling swans on the lake; with our cob busy elsewhere, interlopers have come and set up residence. This may delight us but won't please our bullyboy male. We will be keeping a very close eve on developments.


With all this abundance of new life, I have noticed an increase in the number of cats patrolling the banks. I am always asking dog owners to act responsibly by keeping their pets under control and out of the water but cats are more likely to catch and kill young birds out of instinct. The easiest way to help prevent such activity is to fix a bell to the cat's collar. So cat owners, whether you live near the lake or not, please treat your cat to a bell - it will save lives.

Our anglers have been enjoying some excellent sport. Tench and Bream have showed well and good numbers of our much prized Carp have made an appearance, bringing smiles of delight in front of the camera before gently returning the catch to its watery home.

I hope you have been reading the letters submitted to this magazine recently regarding litter and how some residents have taken it upon themselves to do something about it by getting out there and clearing the mess up. I am sure you will join me in thanking them those individuals for helping to make our Park an altogether cleaner and safer place to live. The best way to show our gratitude is to do our bit by using the litter bins provided, by joining one of our litter pickers or by reporting litter "hot spots" to Woking Borough Council who will get Serco to deal with it. Together we can and will make a difference.

Reducing Bicycle Crime

Recently The Goldsworth Park Safer Neighbourhood Team have noticed an increase in Bicycle thefts. Bikes are being stolen from unsecured garden sheds and those left unsecured outside the gardens.

By following some simple advice, you will lessen your chances of becoming a victim of bicycle crime.

Marking and tagging

A number of marking and tagging systems are available to help safeguard your bicycle.

 Ensure the mark/tag is clearly visible, so a potential thief will see it.

Ensure the mark/tag is secure - use a tamper-resistant label or an inaccessible electronic device.

 Ensure the bike is marked/tagged both on the frame and in another location that's not clearly visible.

Out and about

 Always lock your bicycle- even when leaving it for just a few minutes.

 Lock your bike to an immovable object, such as a bike rack or solid street furniture. Park it safely and considerately - without creating a hazard or obstruction to pedestrians or other road users.

 Secure removable parts and lock wheels and frame together. Remove quick release seats, panniers and bike computers.

Avoid parking your bike in isolated or dimly lit areas.

 Don't leave an expensive bike in the same place on a regular basis. This will prevent it from being noticed and stolen to order.

At home

 Bicycles are often taken from their owner's home. Reduce the likelihood of this happening by storing your bike in a locked garage or shed and keeping it out of view at all times.

I joined Surrey Police at the beginning of 2011 where I initially spent 6 months attached to the Target Patrol Team, following this I moved to CID.

I left this role and joined the Woking Safer Neighbourhood Team in 2012 and am now one of the NSO's for the Goldsworth Park area.

Becoming a police officer is always something that I wanted to do due to the variety of jobs and challenges that I can face on a daily basis and the difference I am able to make to peoples lives.

One of the best things about being an NSO is the close working bond you are able to make with the local community and this puts me in a better position to make a difference.

Goldsworth park is a diverse community and for me that makes the role of being an NSO that more interesting and enjoyable. So far I have only spent a short time in Goldsworth Park but the first thing you notice is that it is a densley populated area with a strong community spirit

I like to take a pro active approach to the job and will be out in the Goldsworth Park area tackling anti social behaviour as well as other local issues raised to me by residents.

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Rhubarb and Strawberry Pie

Crust

350g / 12ozs plain flour

21/2 teaspoons sugar

3/4 teaspoon salt

75g / 3 ozs chilled solid vegetable shortening

75g / 3 ozs chilled unsalted butter

Cold water to mix – about 10 tablespoons

or you could buy ready made shortcrust pastr

For filling

675g / 1½lbs untrimmed weight

450g / 1lb strawberries

150g / 6ozs golden brown sugar

1 heaped tablespoon cornflour

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Method

Make the pastry by lightly rubbing the shortening and butter into the flour and salt until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs then add the sugar. Blend in enough cold water, 2 tablespoons at a time, to form moist clumps. Gather dough into ball and chill until ready to use.

Preheat oven to 200°C / 400°F / Gas mark 6

Trim the rhubarb and cut into ½

inch thick slices. Hull and slice the strawberries if large or halve if small. Mix the fruit with the sugar, cornflour and cinnamon in a large bowl.

Remove the pastry dough from the fridge (or packet), cut in half and form each half into a flattened circle. Roll one circle of dough into a 11 – 12 inch circle and carefully transfer to a 9 inch pie dish. Trim so that the overhang is about 1 inch.

Pile the filling into the pastry case.

Roll out the second circle of dough into 10 – 11 inch circle and cut into fourteen ½ inch-wide strips. Arrange 7 pastry strips over the filling, spacing evenly. Form a lattice by "weaving" the remaining 7 pastry strips in the opposite direction to the first. Trim ends of the pastry strips even with overhang and fold the overhanging bottom layer of pastry back over the ends. Crimp the edges decoratively.

Brush the pastry with milk and sprinkle on a little sugar.

Place the pie on a baking tray and bake for 20 minutes then reduce the temperature to 180°C / 350°F / Gas mark 4 and bake for a further 30 minutes until the pastry is golden and the juices bubble.

Let the pie cool before serving and the juices will gel.

An invaluable member of the Link Leisure team, she also gives advice to new volunteers.

Outstanding Achievement – Nathan Novelli

Nathan has been working hard over the past year to set up a drama school for local children and young people in the community. Mega Theatre opened in September 2011 and classes are run every Wednesday at the Maybury Centre for children and young people, aged between 4 and 16 years old. The first Mega Theatre students recently entered their London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art examinations and achieved a 100% pass rate, a fantastic result. Nathan has organised some impressive opportunities for the students in 2012, including performing in the 'Voice in a Million' concert at Wembley Arena in February, to help raise awareness for children in care. He is also negotiating a slot at the Horsell May Fayre so the children will be able to perform in front of the local community. Through his exceptional dedication, passion and hard work, Nathan has set up an affordable and accessible theatre school in the

Lewis attends St John the Baptist Catholic School and whilst suffering from ulcerative colitis has demonstrated outstanding courage and will power, persevering with his condition and maintaining a positive attitude. Lewis is now attending school full time and is determined to achieve his aim of going to college and studying aeronautical engineering, despite needing to undergo further surgery after his GCSEs.

"Hello" to Woking's New 39th Mayor!

Having retired from work in Knaphill, and after seven years as a Councillor, Cllr Smith planned to step down but was then invited to stand as the Conservative candidate for Horsell East and Woodham, an area in which he has a strong personal interest. He was elected in 2004 and continues to enjoy representing the views of this ward on the Council.

Since being elected, Cllr Smith has served as Chairman of the Planning and Licensing Committees and Vice-Chairman of the Executive, as well as being a contributor to a vast array of Working Groups.

Aside from his political roles, he has also acted as non-executive board member of several health authorities, chaired many independent reviews of patient care, is a member of the Council of Governors of the Ashford and St Peter's Trust and the Surrey Borders Mental Health Trust, is a School Governor at Winston Churchill School and has served

on the board of two local charities.

With such an action-packed year ahead, with the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, it's no surprise Cllr Smith is excited about the celebrations in the Borough during his Mayoral year. He said: "I look forward to the challenges it brings. I have been invited to some street parties, Jubilee parties at the Centres for the Community and Celebrate Woking events, all of which are a fantastic opportunity to celebrate."

Talking about his interests, he said: "I am a keen gardener, theatre-goer, traveller and reader. I am anticipating this year will be very busy indeed and am looking forward to attending the many events in the Borough."

During his mayoral year, Cllr Smith's chosen charity is Macmillan Cancer Support. Speaking of the charity, he said: "Macmillan is a wonderful charity with enthusiastic local support. Its best known role is in the practical support and care offered to sufferers from cancer, but there is another important aspect to its work; the support and advice given to carers and families of patients.

"Approximately one person in three will be affected by cancer during their lifetime and I urge the residents of Woking to help me in helping Macmillan raise funds for them to continue and expand their work."

During the Mayoral year, Cllr Smith will be supported by his wife, **Cllr Anne Murray**, who whilst acting as a Borough Councillor will assume the role of Mayoress, escorting him to a wide range of events and functions.

Woking's Deputy Mayor this year is Cllr Anne Roberts, currently a Liberal Democrat Councillor for Byfleet.

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
