Weather spurs rapid grass growth



Residents of Goldsworth Park may have recently been wondering if they were living in a meadow surrounded

by rolling hills of long grass and wild flowers. As beautiful as this may sound, concerns have been raised by residents regarding the maintenance of public areas on the Park by Woking Borough Council and Serco.

Geoff McManus, Neighbourhood Services Manager at Woking Borough Council said "I have to apologise as we have been experiencing problems in recent weeks maintaining an effective grass cutting regime. The unusual wet weather conditions have slowed down the normal operation and has also served to encourage vigorous grass growth. A combination that has proven difficult to overcome.

However, extra resources are now in place and we hope to have completed the Goldsworth Park before the end of June

and then the following grass cut should put us back on a more agreeable regime.

Highway weed spraying is also taking place at this time so residents should see the weed dying off on the footpaths and in the channel of the road during the next few weeks. Again this application has been delayed due to the wet weather and a further weed spray will take place in September".

If there remain any specific issues to resolve concerning grass cutting or weed growth then residents should contact the Serco helpdesk on 01483 775422 and they will be pleased to assist.

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County Council Report

Flooding at the Amstel Way / Lockfield Drive roundabout was a hot subject for discussion in the Woking Local Committee meeting at the end of June.

When the roads were new the drains at this roundabout coped well_enough, but over the last couple of years they have stopped being effective. To make matters worse the changed road lay-out, designed to help pedestrians by shifting the traffic flow, seems to have had unintended consequences in sending cars through the water when the road floods.

Andrew Milne, Surrey's Area Highways Officer, said there has been investigative work and preventative maintenance, but 'the state of the drainage system is beyond what we can mediate through maintenance work'. It's on a prioritised list of roads liable to flooding, and all of them queuing for a 'large scale solution'.

This list of 'wet spots' covers the whole County, and the scoring (which includes weighting for flooding threats to homes) puts our roundabout so low it 'may be some years before it is attended to.'

Mr. Milne is quite clear 'that is not acceptable' and he is 'looking at alternative means' to get the work done in the coming year. But the finance is still to be found. None of your Councillors are happy about this.

Lockfield Drive

I used to be able to name my three 'worst roads' to boost their priority for resurfacing, but now some money has been delegated down to Local Committees for us to make choices directly. I was surprised at this meeting to find the stretch of Lockfield Drive from Amstel Way to Littlewick Road was not covered by this new budget for 'Localised Structural Repair'.

Happily there was a better answer to this from Mr. Milne than for the flooding problem. Half of Lockfield Drive was resurfaced last year, but it was at that point already in too bad a state for surface dressing, and needed a more thorough job, which took up all the resources available at the time. Resurfacing the second half is still due to happen. It too will need 'proper resurfacing' planning to get the right foundation for the new surface. 'The second half of this financial year remains the intention.'

School Places

Primary Head-Teachers and School Governors have worked effectively with Surrey County Council school planners this year to make sure that there are enough reception places available to meet overall demand in Woking. Numbers of new pupils have grown faster than predictions based on birth rates and new development in the area.

A presentation was given to the Local Committee by Kieran Holliday, one of the Surrey Officers working on this problem.

We now also have the Cabinet Member for Education as a member of the Committee, since Linda Kemeny, the St. John's and Brookwood County Councillor elected last year, continued her meteoric rise to power in Surrey County Council. She has now moved on from her one-month stint as Vice Chairman of the Committee scrutinizing Adult Social Care to being the Councillor responsible for schools and education across Surrey.

Linda commented that the growth in demand for school places in Surrey has been 'absolutely phenomenal', and 'seems to have crept up on us a bit ... it wasn't considered that children would live in flats.'

A wild card that may have knock-on effects in the west of Woking is two army regiments coming back from Cyprus to Pirbright next year. I first read about this in the Chief Executive's report to the Council earlier in June, which said 300 new pupils were expected at Brookwood School. The correct number is more likely to be around 200 across all age groups to be accommodated in several local schools. Kieran Holliday said this was 'sprung on us', but discussions have already begun with schools in order to expand places in the area.

Obviously increased primary school numbers will feed through to the secondary schools. At the moment there are spare secondary places in Woking as a whole. Current projections give a shortfall in 2014, with bigger problems three or four years later.

Discussions are starting with secondary schools about how they could expand. One option to be considered is a new secondary school, even though that risks creating problems in the long run if numbers fall back again.

Don't forget the Olympic Cycling events will close a large number of roads through Surrey on and around these dates, and place pressure on all alternative routes. Not good days for a spontaneous picnic in the Surrey Hills. But do look out for interesting visitors over the Olympics - it's hoped, for example, we'll be welcoming the Mongolian boxing team to Woking.

James Walker Ltd, Martinsyde Ltd, The Oriental Institute and The Royal Dramatic College were all housed on the same present-day site of The Lion Retail Park on Oriental Road in Woking.

The four organisations are the subject of a new exhibition, 'From Mummies to Motorbikes: 150 Years of Culture, Collecting and Commerce on Oriental Road' on show at The Lightbox from 31st July - 7th October 2012. This exhibition will show how these organisations influenced and altered the history of Woking in different ways. From Royal connections, to world cultures and technological advances, the exhibition will give visitors a fascinating insight into the ways in which one building played an important part in Woking life.

In 1926 James Walker Ltd made this site the new home for 'The Lion Works' when they moved to Woking, where they continually expanded the factory around the original Royal Dramatic College building. At one stage James Walker Ltd was the largest employer in Woking with 2000 employees. Today, 'The Lion Works' has gone, although the 'Lion House', the head office of James Walker Group, still occupies a corner of the original site.

COOK'S CORNER

This is a lovely light but tasty cake for a summer tea-time.

Lemon Drizzle Cake



Ingredients

175g / 6oz self raising flour (sifted) 175g / 6oz castor sugar 175g / 6oz butter at room temperature 3 medium free range eggs 1 large unwaxed lemon

1 teaspoon castor sugar

1 tablespoon icing sugar to decorate

or, if you want a really luxurious cake, make a lemon icing with

225g / 8 oz icing sugar (sifted) 1 unwaxed lemon zest and juice

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas Mark 5,

Grease and line a baking tray approximately 20cm square or a round tin 23cm diameter,

Put the butter into a mixing bowl and beat until softened, then add the sugar and cream together until the mixture goes pale in colour,

In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and add them slowly to the butter and sugar mixture a little at a time, beating well,

Add the sifted flour and fold into the mixture until smooth,

Zest the lemon straight into the bowl to keep all of that lovely lemon zest,

Cut the lemon in half; juice one half and stir the juice into the cake mixture,

Juice the other half, add the teaspoon of castor sugar and keep it to one side for the drizzle.

Pour the cake mixture into the prepared tin and smooth the top,

Bake for about 20-25 minutes until it is golden brown and cooked through,

When cooked and whilst it is still hot, prick the cake all over with a fine skewer or cocktail stick then, using a spoon, dribble the drizzle mixture over the cake,

Leave it to cool completely then sieve the icing sugar over it.

If you want to use icing, sift the icing sugar into a bowl and add the lemon zest and juice, stirring until smooth,

When the cake is almost cool, put it on a serving plate and pour the icing carefully over the top. If you pour it on to the middle of the cake, then let gravity disperse the icing down the sides, you get the 'drizzle' effect!





Foul Play Campaign launches in a bid to rid the stink

A Horsell resident has been shown a red card after failing to clean up after letting her dog take part in Foul Play.

Neighbourhood Officers issued a Fixed Penalty Notice after witnessing the dog fouling, followed by the resident failing to clear up the dog mess, after

increasing patrols as part of Woking Borough Council's Foul Play anti-dog fouling campaign.

In an effort to 'flush out' the dirty habit and to kick off the campaign, Woking Borough Council's Animal Warden and Neighbourhood Officers will be hitting local dog walking spots, distributing information leaflets, dog poop bags courtesy of Dogs Trust and dog treats. They will also give advice to dog walkers on cleaning up after their dogs whilst encouraging people to report perpetrators.

The campaign kicked off on Thursday, 14 June in Silistria Close, Knaphill during National Poop Scoop Week. Armed with the messages "You wouldn't do it in the street, so why let your dog?" and "Don't let Woking be your dumping ground", the campaign will emphasise the anti-social nature of fouling in our streets. It has also seen the introduction of new bins, located in spots chosen with the help of local residents.

Dog fouling is unsightly and poses serious health risks, especially for young children who may tread in it. Residents with dogs are being urged to use the extra bins provided and if one isn't at hand, take the mess home in a sealed bag or place it in a rubbish bin.

TV Amnesty a Smash!

A temporary scheme that enabled residents to recycle their old analogue television sets has been

declared a success by the Borough Council.

Residents presented over 600 unwanted television sets over the period of the scheme, which ended last week. All sets collected have been separated and the parts recycled.

Although the free collection scheme has now ceased, households wishing to recycle their unwanted TV sets can take them to a Community Recycling Centre, such as Martyrs Lane or Slyfield, or they can be collected as part of the Council's chargeable bulky waste collection service.

Residents are also reminded that they can continue to recycle small electrical items. To take part, simply put the small electrical items in a carrier bag, and place it next to your waste or recycling on your normal collection day. The refuse vehicles have been fitted with a small compartment that can accommodate items no larger than 35cm by 40cm.

Another successful year! That was the message for Goldsworth Care members at their Annual General Meeting on June 19.

Those present heard reports on the group's activities in the year to March 2012 from Marian

Alden, Chairman, Peter Roberts, Treasurer and Pat Checksfield, Volunteer Co-ordinator.

The group completed ten years of service to the Goldsworth community and, in February, did its 5,000th job. Currently it had 40 volunteers and 105 clients and during the year had done over 600 jobs They included escorting clients to hospitals or doctors' surgeries (331) and helping with shopping needs (148). In arranging these jobs, Duty Officers had taken 692 inward calls and made 1,171 outward calls.

Vicki Turton of Surrey Community Action told the meeting that Goldsworth Care was among the most active of the Good Neighbour groups in the
