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"To remember all who suffer as a result of war" - this year's Remembrance Service served as a double reminder of the cost of war and freedom, both past, present and future.

Taking place on the second Sunday in November, this year Remembrance Sunday fell on the 11th November thereby incorporating Armistice Day as well. The next time this will happen will fortuitously be on the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1 in 2018.

Showing our respect...

Canon Richard Cook from St. Andrew's Church led the service that started on a glorious sunny morning in Goldsworth Park. At 10.45am, the Parade of the Goldsworth Park Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, Guides, Brownies and Rainbows, with their leaders, assembled in front of the Health Centre. A large crowd had gathered, including relatives and friends of those whose names are recorded on the Memorial Stones, from Slocock's Nursery.

Canon Cook spoke of the tragic and costly sacrifice made by those who died in the two World Wars. He stated that while some conflicts arise, as evil is confronted, many arise because we are greedy, and want what belongs to someone else. He said: "Jesus spoke of the evil from within, which emerges and causes trouble for all concerned. But He calls us to choose a different way, as we live lives of service to others."

After Canon Cook's inspiring words, local groups, community representatives, Councillors and family members of the fallen heroes were invited to lay remembrance poppy wreaths and crosses at the memorial.

Worst Roads on Goldsworth Park?

Money for road resurfacing has been allocated on a year-by-year basis up to now, but Surrey is trying to make the system more efficient by putting together a five-year programme. This is a central £90M budget, separate from the money for local road schemes and small repairs.

After assessment, they've come up with 56 schemes for Woking. In or on the borders of Goldsworth Park, this includes Anchor Hill, Hermitage Road, Kestrel Way, and Bampton Way. They've also carried out a very limited public consultation, which has attracted only 26 road nominations in Woking. For Goldsworth Park, this includes the junction of Silversmiths Way with Goldsworth Road and – unsurprisingly – Lockfield Drive.

(More of Lockfield Drive should have been resurfaced by the time you read this; it's scheduled for between 27th and 30th November according to the latest e-mail to reach me.)

If there are other roads in Goldsworth Park you think are showing signs of needing complete resurfacing, please let me know and I'll ask for them to be assessed for inclusion in the programme. Alternatively you can e-mail improvemyroad@surreycc.gov.uk.

More about Lakers

Last month I wrote about out of schoolhours activities for young people at Lakers, now being managed by the YMCA under Surrey's contract with the 'Surrey Youth Consortium'. Even when they get up to speed, this still leaves the building underused in the daytime. Good news now is that the proposed 'Skill Centre' to be based at Lakers is going to be run by the Surrey Care Trust.

The idea of a Skill Centre is to offer training to 'disengaged' young people who don't go on in school or College after sixteen, but aren't in work or training either. The aim is to re-engage them in doing the things that will let them move on to whatever they want to do with their lives, whether through apprenticeships, employment, or by coming back to more formal education. They need places that aren't too far away so that they are easy to get to, and don't feel as daunting as a school or College.

Although this is new for Lakers, it's not new for the Surrey Care Trust. In Woking, they already run the 'Steps' course for unemployed young people, using the Crescent Project building in Heathside Crescent. They also run courses at Weyside Court here on Goldsworth Park, which offer 'alternative education' to school age children (14 - 16) who for a variety of reasons most

often linked to problems in their lives have dropped out of mainstream education. This usually means they have missed a lot of school, so catching up on basic literacy and numeracy in a protective, unthreatening environment is key to helping them find their way forward.

The Skills Centre should be opening early in the New Year, and I'm looking forward to seeing what happens. Lakers is a great building for this sort of use, with an informal, welcoming design and good separate meeting rooms, not to mention the outdoors ball court and the sports hall, all begging to be fully used.

A better deal for 17 and 18 year olds

The underlying reason why Skills Centres are being developed now is the Raising of the Participation Age (RPA). From 2013 young people have to stay on in full-time education for the academic year in which they become 17, go into an apprenticeship, or combine part-time education and training with some form of work. (This can be employment, self-employment, or at least 20 hours a week volunteering.) From 2015, the Participation Age moves up to 18.

When this becomes a legal requirement, funding will follow the pupils. Then the Skills Centres Surrey County Council is planning to develop throughout the County will be financially sustainable as part of the overall provision.

And more from Trading Standards ...

I told you about Surrey Trading Standards investigation of charity doorstep collections a couple of months ago, but they're investigating new tricks and scams all the time. One of the latest starts with a phone call supposedly from a courier company checking you're in to receive a delivery. When this arrives (flowers and a bottle of wine) the delivery man tells you there's a £3.50 delivery charge. One person who fell for this scam used a debit card, saw it swiped through a mobile card machine, put in their pin, and received a receipt. Next day £4,000 had gone from their account.

COOK'S CORNER

MINCE PIES



I would like to thank Jamie Oliver for this unusual take on the traditional Christmas mince pie.

Ingredients - makes 24

- 100g good-quality mincemeat
- 25g dried cranberries or blueberries, chopped
- Zest of 2 clementines
- A splash of sherry or brandy
- Flour, to dust
- 250g good puff pastry
- 1 pack filo pastry
- 50g melted butter
- 1 free-range egg, beaten
- 50g flaked almonds
- Icing sugar, to dust

Method

Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/gas 6. Scoop the mincemeat into a mixing bowl and mix in the dried berries, the clementine zest and the sherry or brandy.

Roll out the puff pastry into a big rectangle about 20x40cm/8x16 inch and the thickness of a pound coin. Thinly spread the mincemeat over the pastry, leaving a 1cm/½ inch gap around the edges. Tightly roll up the pastry, lengthways, like a Swiss roll, place it on a floured tray, and pop in the fridge to firm up.

Take two cupcake trays (for 12 cupcakes each) and butter each one lightly with the melted butter. Place one layer of filo pastry over the tray (you may need more than one sheet to cover each tray depending on the size of the sheets) and ease the pastry into each hole. Brush with the melted butter, then cover with a second layer of filo pastry. Brush with butter again.

Take the puff pastry roll out of the fridge and, with a sharp knife, cut it into 24 slices. Place each slice, flat-side down, into a filo-lined hole. Brush with the egg and sprinkle a few flaked almonds on top of each little pie, then pop both trays in the oven for about 25 minutes, until cooked and golden brown.

Leave to cool, then crack the individual pies out of the trays. Dust with a little icing sugar before serving.

Tip: You can freeze the cooked, cooled mince pies in their trays (just wrap the lot in cling film) or in a plastic container. Just reheat them in a hot oven straight from the freezer.

Woking businesses light up Christmas

Woking wastes no time moving up the National League table

Recent figures released by the Department for Environment, Food

and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) reveal that Woking Borough Council continues to win the battle against household waste. The Borough jumped eight places up the national recycling, composting and reuse league table from 29th to 21st place, out of 352 local authorities across the country.

The improved annual figures for 2011/2012 can be attributed to the Borough's and residents' continued commitment to recycling, composting and reuse by increasing the local recycling rate from 54% to 57% over the last year. Even more importantly, this means that the amount of general waste (black bin) has reduced. The league table also positions authorities based on the lowest amounts of general waste produced per household. Woking achieved 16th place with households producing an average of just 370kg of general waste each year.

With a 60% plus recycling rate in its sights,

the Council introduced a range of new and improved recycling and reuse services over the last year, including the small Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) kerbside collection service and food waste collection service for flats. It has also continued to roll out a comprehensive awareness programme, including attendance at key local events and locations, a doorstep campaign where recycling advisors visited homes across the Borough to raise awareness of the Council's recycling services, and expanding the garden waste collection scheme beyond 12,000 subscribers to meet demand.


A very special performance of Handel's Messiah

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Catching up with Lakers

Introducing the New Manager...

I would like to introduce myself, I am Sandie Bolger, the new Youth and Community Worker for Lakers Youth Centre. I started at the youth centre in June and have got to know the area and partner organisations over the past few months.

What's on...

Many things have been happening at the youth centre which have included:

- Identifying the needs of the young people who participate at the club
- Getting to know the youth work staff and reviewing the opening
- Setting up a Steering Group led by young people with members of the local community, police, borough and county council.
- Training young people to set up their own tuck shop
- Security marking of bikes and mobile phones with the police
- A graffitti project in the basket ball court
- Advertising for and employing a Youth Worker in Charge
- Increasing the opening hours for young people.

The Steering Group is now up and running and is called HOVE.R (Hear 7 Our Voices Everyone. Respect). The group have spent the last month or so finding out what a steering group is, the roles and responsibilities within that and we have a core group of eight young people. The steering group was launched on Wednesday 17th October with invited guests who have agreed to support the group.

The tuck shop has been named Lakers Bakers and will be opening soon, young people have been trained in food hygiene, financial procedures and the youth centre is signed up with the Foods Standards Agency through Woking Borough Council. All profits from the tuck shop will go back into the centre to subsidise trips, activities and resources.

We are now signed up to the 'Get It On Scheme' and can distribute condoms and Chlymydia testing alongside advice and support around Sexual Health and Relationships. The 'Get it on Scheme' is available during open sessions and on Thursdays between 4 – 6 pm, professional guide lines are followed by the youth workers when working with young people around sexual health.

Keeping the memories alive...



1941 as a quarter of the crew were from Southern Rhodesia. Sergeant Pilot Drew, flying in a Lancaster took off at 22:01 from Dunholme Lodge (Lincs) on 17 August 1943. The aircraft was shot down on the raid over Peenemunde (Baltic) – to stop the Germans building more VI & VII rockets – on the night of 17/18 August 1943. During this raid, 237 aircrew were killed and 45 taken POW. Sergeant Pilot Drew was killed in action that night and even though he has no known grave, he is honoured and remembered on the Runnymede Airforces Memorial as well as the Slocock Nursery Commemorative stones at Goldsworth Park. He was only 33 when he died.

"For King and Country in memory of J. Drew" - Sgt. William John Drew was born in 1910 and was known as John to his family and friends. He was the only son of Emma and William Drew, and lived at 42 Arnold Road, Woking, as a child. The family later moved to The Dell in St John's Road where his mother ran a boarding house for retired ladies. Sgt. Drew was the only son in the family with 5 sisters.

Sadly, he never married and his father had already died in 1939, so John was the only male in the family and was well loved by his mother and sisters, who greatly missed him when he died.

John's niece, Liz Pennick was joined by her husband, Mike and her sister, Maggie Willson to honour her uncle at the Remembrance Day service. Liz said: "I know my Mother would have been very pleased that John is still being commemorated if she had been alive today. He gave his life so that we can all live safely today and I am very proud to be his relative, even though I never had the chance to meet him."
