Coffee Shop for Goldsworth Park Centre

The proposal to open a Costa Goldsworth Park shopping centre seems to have generated a lot of speculation and rumour, leading to very mixed reactions. There are some who feel that there is already enough competition in provision of coffee here, but both Waitrose and Martin's believe Costa will enhance the area and many residents welcome the introduction of a coffee shop in the centre, particularly as it would be open for longer each day and at weekends. Surely, competition and choice are good for the consumer.

There were also fears that the proposal would impact on the children's play area and seating but these are unfounded - see lead story on front page.

The Council has yet to determine the outcome of the planning application, number 2014/0295 on the planning website. The GPCA has made comments to ensure that issues about deliveries, waste collection and parking for employees are considered, but is not objecting to the application.

Feeling flushed with success, by Irene Watson

The GPCA would like to thank everyone who supported our campaign for a proper public toilet for Goldsworth Park. In total, we collected well over 500 signatures on the paper petition and a further 250+ on the e-petition. We have presented the petition to Ray Morgan, Chief Executive of Woking Borough Council, and are waiting for a formal response.

This is just a formality, however, as he has informed us that a public toilet will be constructed in the building between Goldwater Lodge and the changing-room block. This is where the GPCA has always said the facilities should be. We have spoken to the officers concerned and have even seen the plans. There will be separate ladies and gents loos opening off a corridor and a separate toilet for disabled users, with its own entrance.

We hope that this part of the project will be finished in September. The "super-loo" will be removed in July when the contract ends so there will be a gap of two or three months until the new facility is completed but we can live with that, don't you think?



Signs the Hospice is on the move

You may have seen things starting to happen at the new Hospice site in Denton Way. A sign has been erected announcing our arrival in Spring 2016 and the initial clearing out process has begun. The plans have been submitted to Woking Borough Council and we are hoping that building work can start before the end of the year.

We continue to raise awareness of exactly what Hospice Care means to a community. It is so much more than just a building; it's a philosophy of care which alongside nursing care focuses on an individual's practical, emotional and spiritual needs. We care for people both in the Hospice buildings and in their own homes; in fact for every one patient being



contact with the Hospice, a whole range of services become available including day care, therapeutic care and counselling for adults, young people and children. As I write, we are currently supporting over 500 families through very challenging times.

The Dragon Boat Charity Challenge will have taken place at the Goldsworth Lake by the time you read this. There were teams representing the local Police, Barclays Bank and Scorpion Training Boot Camp, to mention a few.

As the first reports of the matter implied that the tenant shops were in agreement with the proposal to remove the play equipment "for health and safety reasons", I spoke to all of them. While all agreed that there were accidents, they said they were minor – what you would expect when children played. However, they nearly all said that there were more accidents with older people slipping and tripping on the uneven paving outside the shops than there were with children.

I spoke to a representative of the managing agents who was kind enough to send the following statement.

"As managing agents on behalf of the Landlord of Goldsworth Park, it is our duty to maintain, repair, and cleanse the common parts within the retail centre. It is thought that the existing common space is in poor condition, aesthetically unpleasing and provides inadequate/poor seating, so we intend to carry out improvement works to the area. The first stage of these works will include the removal of the existing play equipment, at the Landlord's

cost, which is deteriorating and considered potentially hazardous to children. It is the Landlord's intention to replace the existing climbing frame with new, low level play apparatus for local children to use and enjoy, improve the general attractiveness of the area and improve the seating for adults and children."

She added that she hoped that the above statement will put the local residents at rest in the knowledge that the equipment will be replaced in due course.

I raised the issue of the paving and the accidents to older people and she was concerned. She said that their intention was to refurbish the whole courtyard, to repaint and relocate the seating and brighten up the surface of the children's play area. They will take appropriate action over the paving during this process.

The managing agents have promised to keep me informed of any site works updates going forward – so watch this space.






Navigate the Goldsworth Park maze

HeartBeat of Woking



HeartBeat Support Woking (HBSW) is a registered charity, set up as a much-needed support group for recovering heart patients and their families and carers. It holds its monthly meetings at TS Dianthus building, overlooking the Goldsworth Lake.

Now in its 12th year, it has grown, much like small acorns, into a strong fundraising organisation to support the Rehab Unit and the Coronary Care Unit, together with other cardiac related projects at St Peter's Hospital. (The charity has raised in excess of £75,000 during its 12 years). Much of the gym equipment in Cardiac Rehab, including a water tower, a state-of-the-art computer software system linking ambulances with the CCU, heart monitoring equipment, crash trolley and defibrillator were among many items donated by HBSW. We are now in the process of funding a much needed Relatives Room in Coronary Care together with a quiet viewing garden.

We have now established a team of volunteers who visit patients at their bedside in CCU to help reassure them that there is a life to be lived after heart problems.

On the back of this, in 2012, the group were proud to receive, along with the other St. Peter's volunteers, the Queen's Award to Volunteering (the group equivalent of an MBE).

Each month speakers on various subjects (not just heart and health related) speak to the group at TS Dianthus building. Anyone is welcome to come along to our meetings, held on the first Thursday of each month. Cost is just £2 on the door. A fundraising raffle is held at each meeting.

Other fundraising events include: an annual Quiz Night held in November at The Good Shepherd Church in Pyrford (to accommodate much larger numbers!) and a Christmas dinner/dance at Chobham Golf Club.

Individual members have also 'done their bit'. A former chairman jumped out of an aeroplane at 12,500ft! The present Chairman walked the 100 miles of the South Downs Way and just recently a member climbed the heights of Sydney Harbour Bridge! Many other groups and individuals have done fundraising in aid of HBSW.

Woking resident Mrs Fuoco, 50, vice-chair and swim co-ordinator for Surrey Dolphins Swimobility, was one of thousands selected for the royal garden party but one of just a handful who got to meet the Queen. She was accompanied by her husband, John, and daughters Rosie and Georgina.

And it was another chance to celebrate for the Knaphill resident after she was awarded a British Empire Medal in the New Year's Honours List in January.

Mrs Fuoco got the chance to discuss with the Queen the valuable work of the club, which offers swimming and water therapy for those with physical

disabilities. The assisted swim charity is based at Woking Leisure Centre and offers a real lifeline to adults across Surrey, who have the chance to swim and exercise in a safe and friendly environment.

Those who volunteer with Mrs Fuoco describe her as an individual who goes above and beyond for the people she works with, visiting unwell members in hospital and being a great advocate on their behalf.

She said: "It was all a bit surreal but the Queen asked lots about the charity. She knows Guildford and Woking but she hasn't been for a while and she talked to my children about their jobs. It was really special."

To celebrate Mrs Fuoco's success, there was a Picnic in the Park for members of the charity on July 3 at Woking's Pool in the Park.

Park people are a lucky lot. It's been great to get out and about in the sunshine to enjoy Goldsworth looking beautiful.

A great part of Goldsworth Park's appeal is its abundance of mature trees and wide swathes of green verge. For that we must thank the foresight of planning consultants, working with Woking Borough Council some 40 years ago.

They used this former nursery land as a blank canvass on which to design a place where people would love to live.

The road network was designed with a bypass road (Lockfield Drive) serving carrier roads (Bampton Way, Denton Way, Kirkland Avenue and Sythwood), lined with grass verges. These feed residential streets, all branched cul-de-sacs. Roads curve to break monotony. The planners prescribed a variety of housing in each locality on the Park, to mix together different types of household.

A substantial footpath network was laid out, to encourage

walking to shops, schools and local amenities.

Some mature trees were left where they stood; many others were moved elsewhere on the Park. Hundreds of saplings of various tree varieties were planted. These are now mature trees for us to enjoy.

The lake is the sparkling jewel in Goldsworth Park's crown. The planners knew it would be a superb leisure amenity, but its function is to store water from the Park's streets temporarily during heavy rainfall, until it can be released into the river system.

The lake and recreation grounds are on the northern side of the Park because the area was damp and liable to flooding. After the lake was constructed, adjacent areas could not be built on for four years to allow the ground to dry out.

So, when you next take a stroll around the Park's paths and its sparkling jewel of water, say a little "thank you" to the planners who defined gorgeous Goldsworth Park and made it a great place for us to live.

It was all smiles at Goldsworth Park in June when local club, Goldsworth Park Rangers held their annual community youth football festival. Boys and girls of all ages from under-6 to under-14, laced up their boots for a crack at the tournament and a chance to take home a coveted medal.

At the under-7 and under-8 age group, a round robin series of matches was held on a non-competitive basis, with all players receiving medals from the Surrey Primary League. For many youngsters this was their first taste of tournament football and a good time was had by all.

For the other age groups, matches were played as leagues and knock outs to determine the cup winners, in an ideal warm up for the World Cup! Winners came from many different clubs, including Worplesdon, Onslow, Send and Brooklands, with special mention to AFC Wimbledon girls' teams, who won both the under-11 and under-13 competitions. Hosts Goldsworth Park Rangers supplied the winners of four competitions, including their under 10 team, completing the treble following their Premier league and Surrey cup wins earlier in the season.

Goldsworth Park Rangers chairman, Lee Swain, paid tribute to everyone who was involved in organising the event and gave special thanks to the many parents who volunteered on the day to help make it a huge success. He said "It was great to see so many kids enjoying themselves playing football in Goldsworth Park, in front of so many parents, friends and family. Soldiers help create peace garden

- British Army soldiers, including members of the Armed Forces Muslim Association, last month helped with ground preparation at Woking's Muslim Burial Ground to create an Islamic-style peace garden - a place of quiet contemplation and remembrance. It will feature 27 Himalayan birch trees representing the original number of servicemen buried at the site.

The Sound of free music - Residents and visitors to Woking will again be treated to free music every Saturday until September 13, 2014. The Summer Sounds concerts will take place on the putting green in Woking Park, and feature a selection of music, including local brass and jazz bands.

Help for dementia sufferers - The Woking Wellbeing Centre, opened in May and located at the Vyne Centre for the Community in Knaphill, is a local hub for information and support services relating to memory loss, dementia (particularly for those in the early stages or prior to diagnosis) and associated problems. In addition to a programme of weekly sessions to promote wellbeing and independent living, a drop-in advice service is available every Thursday between 9am and noon.

Don't let your loved ones get lost - A credit card-sized device is to

be offered to people with dementia to help prevent them becoming one of the tens of thousands of adults with the condition who go missing across the country each year. The GPS device allows a route by bus, train or onfoot journey to be plotted, and if the user strays, relatives get an alert on their smartphone or computer with a link to a Google map pinpointing the person's location.

On your bike - Help others to race by volunteering to help out at this summer's Prudential RideLondon-Surrey cycling festival. Volunteers are needed by the organisers of the events, which include the RideLondon-Surrey 100 mass-participation event and the RideLondon-Surrey Classic race, for professionals, on Sunday August 10. More information, including details about registering, can be found at prudentialridelondon.co.uk.

Medals for Woking Young athletes –Woking youngsters proved themselves sporting superstars in June when they came overall second at this year's P&G Surrey Youth Games at Guildford, with a clutch of medals and scoring some great team performances.
