





This work is unusual in that the text is in German and is based on the Luther Bible, in contrast to the traditional Roman Catholic Requiem Mass in Latin. Waste and recycling questionnaire



Woking Borough Council has asked us to share the following letter with you.

Dear resident.

I am writing to ask for your view on the Council's waste and recycling services. This questionnaire is aimed at continuously improving the existing services.

In the ten years since the Council fundamentally changed its approach to household waste collection with the introduction of wheeled bins and alternating weekly collections, the level of recycling has increased from 19% in 2003/04 to 59% in 2013/14.

This is still not enough. More than half of what is being thrown into the black bins could be recycled using the blue bins and food caddies provided. This Following its move to bright, modern costs half a million pounds more, each year, than it would to recycle the premises on Goldsworth Park (the waste. Our aim is to encourage residents to further reduce their black bin waste and recycle the 7,000 tonnes of recyclables currently going to waste each year. This survey will help by telling us

- how satisfied you are with the current service
- what we can improve and
- how to plan for future re-tendering of the service contract.

All completed surveys will be treated in the strictest confidence and will only be used to appraise our waste and recycling service.

The Captain's Charity this year was the Headley Court Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre in Leatherhead. The Club Captain, Heather Nice, collected for the centre since the beginning of the season in April 2014. Members and visitors to the club were asked to donate their small change at the end of the after match meal and the pennies soon mounted up.

In August, club members took part in a Charity Drive and Games of Skill to raise funds for the charity. This was a very enjoyable day, with members and friends taking part in bowling related games, followed by a short match, tea and a raffle. Thanks to the generosity of the bowlers the amount raised was £320, which brought the total collected to £840. Further collections until the end of the season raised the Grand Total to £1220.

The cheque for £1220 collected for the Captain's Charity, was presented to Marine Warrant Officer George Dent at Headley Court Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre, Leatherhead by Heather Nice on 26th September.

This money will be placed in the DMRC Benevolent Fund, which purchases special goods and services for the patients while they undergo their rehabilitation programmes over and above the usual facilities provided by the public purse. A tour of the centre and the facilities available was very illuminating and showed how much is done for injured service men and women.

Happy ending for Bentley the lucky dog by Royer Slater Reprinted by kind permission from Woking News & Mail

Bentley is one very lucky dog. He now has a loving home after enduring horrendous injuries which led to his rescue and rehoming by the RSPCA.

Bentley featured in the RSPCA Pets' Corner of the Woking News & Mail. Liz Woods of the RSPCA Millbrook Animal Centre in Chobham said: "He still bears large scars but has the most wonderfully loving personality."

Bentley was just the pet Laurie and Gill Hubbard were looking for. The couple from Goldsworth Park had a doggyshaped holes in their lives and home after the loss of Charlie, their beloved Jack Russell. "We wanted a rescue dog, as Charlie had been," explained Laurie. "I happened to notice a very friendly dog called Bentley at a neighbour's. Bentley came to me and we clicked instantly. I thought at first he was the neighbours' own pet, then learned they were fostering him for the RSPCA.

"I went straight home and told Gill, 'I think we've found our dog!"

Bentley had suffered terrible burns on his back, shoulder and chest, caused by boiling water or acid. Instead of taking him to a vet, his original owner merely covered the wounds with gaffer tape, which made the injuries worse.

"Bentley lost layers of flesh and required lots of medical treatment by the RSPCA," explained Gill. "Despite all he endured, he's exactly the friendly, loving creature described in the News & Mail."

Laurie contacted RSPCA Millbrook to offer Bentley a home. "They had to check us out first," he recalled. "The inspector especially wanted to be sure Gill could cope with Bentley as she's in a wheelchair. So we started to take him for a walk. Bentley didn't let us down - he went straight to Gill and gave her a big sloppy

"After 50 yards, the inspector said: 'No problem - he's yours'!"

Bentley featured in a recent RSPCA media campaign highlighting a 14% increase in animal cruelty in Surrey, from 35 cases in 2012 to 40 last year. It led to Laurie and Gill being photographed by newspapers at their Goldsworth Park home and Laurie being interviewed by BBC Surrey for a radio feature, broadcast in the station's breakfast show.

Bentley has had a very lucky escape from cruelty. The RSPCA's Liz Woods hit the spot in the original newspaper report, saying: "His new owners will absolutely love him." And it's clear Bentley is returning that love to Laurie and Gill!

Hawks and Eagles flying high for Goldsworth Park Rangers Football Club by Simon Barron







Last weekend the football club welcomed its two newest teams to the pitch, the under-7 Hawks and the under-7 Eagles, playing in their first ever matches.

The boys and girls are in their first season of playing football for the club, having been through GPR's thriving under-6 youth development programme over the last couple of years. They train at Goldsworth Park on Saturdays and play matches in the Surrey Primary League on a Sunday morning. Under the FA's new youth development guidelines, under-7 teams play five-a-side football, on appropriately sized pitches with small sized goals. This gives all the children plenty of opportunities to get involved and they are all loving playing football.

Their first games were certainly entertaining matches. In an end-to-end rollercoaster of a match, the Hawks narrowly lost 7-6, with the Eagles going goal crazy in their match to run out 13-1 winners.

Free hearing aid maintenance

NHS hearing aid users can soon make use of a free maintenance service for their devices on Goldsworth Park. NHS-trained volunteers will provide battery replacement. re-tubing and general maintenance for the aids on the first Wednesday of each month. "People with NHS hearing aid problems can drop in any time between 1pm and 3pm at the Coffee Shop Café in St Andrew's Church," said a spokesman. "There's no need to make an appointment but they should bring their brown NHS book."

"We are initially offering the service monthly, but may offer sessions more frequently if there is a demand.

"Apart from a flat battery - which we can replace if necessary - the most common problems with NHS hearing aids are caused by the tubing. It might be blocked by wax, or its plastic may have deteriorated which affects the sound. In most cases we will fit new tubing: it's a good idea to do this every six months or so in any case."

St Andrew's Church is located between the health centre and the shops at Goldsworth Park Centre.

From the Lakeside

Roger Westcott is one of the voluntary fishing bailiffs appointed by Woking Borough Council to oversee fishing, monitor fish stocks and other wildlife, and to keep the area generally clean and tidy.

With such warm weather throughout much of the year, both flora and fauna have been exceptionally busy. From mighty oaks to blades of grass, growth has far exceeded the norm, while birds, insects and mammals, large and small, have been raising families and getting fat on the abundance of food that not us provides. But some the winter menths, wildlife that despit hibernate or migrate to warmer climes to

nature provides. But come the winter months, wildlife that doesn't hibernate or migrate to warmer climes has to face lean times and, sadly, many won't survive.

Fortunately, we are a nation of animal lovers, and many thousands of us help to make up the winter shortfall of food by creating bird tables and feeders in our gardens or making regular trips to the lake armed with bags of bread for



the wildfowl. This is commendable, but there is a downside. With your garden feeders, you are the only provider probably putting out wholesome, good quality food specially designed to provide a balanced diet for small birds, but this is not the case when we feed the ducks and swans on the lake. "One or two slices of bread won't do any harm" you might think, but the lake has many visitors and feeding the ducks is one of the most popular pastimes, especially for families with children. While this is great fun and an excellent way for youngsters to get close to nature, there is a downside; bread in such large quantities is not good for the birds as it offers no true nutritional value AND it attracts unwanted wildlife – RATS.

I have no desire to discourage anyone from feeding the birds, as they have come to rely on us for a treat, particularly in the winter. All I ask is that, before you save up all that unwanted bread, often past its best, you consider other forms of food that will be more beneficial. A

slice or two of wholemeal bread – not white bread – is OK, but most pet shops and garden centres stock wildfowl pellets or corn at very little cost, which will give our ducks and swans a treat and lots more nutritional value. And remember, always throw food onto the water and NOT on the banks – feed the ducks, not the rats!

Rats, like the other wildlife, have had a successful year, rearing many families; they are a part of the wild scene but a part that most of us could do without. The Council has a programme of control in place but this has had little effect on numbers so we must help by cutting their food supply. So don't leave food meant for the ducks on the bank, and if you have a picnic, make sure you pack up all the leftovers. There are plenty of bins around or, better still, take your rubbish home to dispose of – keeping our open spaces litter and food free will help to keep them RAT FREE.

Unfortunately, we have another unwanted species in Goldsworth Park. It has come to our notice that some very foolish person has released some catfish into the lake. Apart from the fact that it is a serious offence which carries a heavy fine to introduce any non-native species into the wild, it has adverse effects on the environment. The species in question is the WELS CATFISH (Silurus glanis), a native of central and eastern Europe. A formidable predator, they are capable of growing to huge proportions, and individual fish have been known to exceed 9ft long and weigh several hundred pounds. They're hermaphroditic, meaning they can breed regardless of what sex they are.

We have notified the Environment Agency and have been advised that we must take steps to remove them; any angler who catches a catfish and returns it to the lake is open to prosecution. Due to the size and depth of the lake, netting them is not an option, leaving rod and line our only choice. The message to all anglers on the lake is clear – if you catch a catfish, DO NOT put it back but put it in a keep net, landing net or carp sling and report immediately to a bailiff or the

Environment Agency (numbers below), who will arrange for the fish to be removed and rehomed in a Section 30 licensed water.

These numbers can also be found on the noticeboard between the car park and the lake. Let's hope that the interlopers can be removed quickly before they eat their way through the fish stocks, or breed.
