The debate goes on

Controversy over the Council's proposal to create two more junior football pitches on the recreation ground continues unabated. Those against the proposal highlight the proximity of the pitches to dwellings and argue that the remaining piece of open land in the recreation ground, which they call the North Meadow, should be kept for the benefit of residents and the flora and fauna. Those in favour of the proposal talk of meeting the needs of the hundreds of children who play football and point out that marking out two junior pitches will not prevent people using the area most of the time.

The arguments can be put on hold for a few months; the Council has informed the GPCA that work to install two additional junior pitches will be postponed until the outcome of a review of its Playing Pitch Strategy, identifying future needs for the borough as a whole, has been published, hopefully in July. The review will involve consultations with a variety of partners and National Governing Bodies on future club development needs and mapped against the future demographic needs for the borough. The conclusions of the report will specify how many and of what level of facility provision will be needed in the way of playing pitches to meet future demands. If there appears to be a shortfall in existing provision, the Council will look at its own land, including Goldsworth Park Recreation Ground, as well as whether they could use local school facilities or

any suitable third party land when deciding on future provision. Once there is an agreed position on the football pitches, the Council will then update and progress the plans for the wider improvements proposed for Goldsworth Park Recreation Ground.

The GPCA recognises the arguments on both sides and hopes that a solution can be found that satisfies everyone. What do our readers think?

Free hearing aid service has busiest month

A free monthly hearing aid maintenance service which has operated on Goldsworth Park for 18 months had its busiest-ever session on 6th April.

"We had 42 attending the clinic for hearing aid re-tubing and advice, with an additional 14 swapping batteries making 56 in all," said Barry Nay, co-ordinator of the service for NHS hearing aids users.

Each month on the first Wednesday, NHS-trained volunteers

from local churches provide retubing, battery replacement and general maintenance for NHS aids in St Andrew's Church at Goldsworth Park Centre. "There's no need to make an appointment," explained Barry. "Hearing aid users can call in any time between 1pm and 3pm at the church's Coffee Shop café. They should bring their brown NHS book."

St Andrew's Church is located between the health centre and the shops at Goldsworth Park Centre.

Keep your dog on a lead round Goldsworth Park Lake – the information and by-law signs state that, where signposted, dogs must be kept on leads. Signs have been put up informing dog walkers that their dogs MUST be kept on leads round the lake and within 25m of it. This is to ensure that dog excrement is picked up, to protect wildlife, to reduce the nuisance to other visitors and anglers, and to protect dogs from the potential risk of infection or injury in the lake. Growing your own!

Growing your own vegetables and fruit has never been more popular as it is now. The two nearest allotment organisations to Goldsworth Park are Horsell Allotment Association which operates both Horsell Allotments in Bullbeggars Lane and Littlewick Allotments in Carthouse Lane. Knaphill Allotment Association runs the site known as Ryde Heron and is located in Creston Avenue.



Horsell allotments has over 180 plots across its two sites where a variety of vegetables, fruit and flowers are enthusiastically grown. They have a website and the address is www.horsellallots.wordpress. com. The Ryde Heron site has 109 plots and is a "self-managed" site by a management committee.

Regardless of whether you are an experienced or novice gardener an allotment can offer you more than you think! It can provide you with a new hobby, fresh home grown produce and, last but not least, exercise. In addition, allotment gardening allows you to have more control over the foods you are eating and, of course, it can save you money.

Due to their current popularity, both of the allotment sites are likely to have a waiting list so if you are thinking of having your own plot it is best to make contact with the associations as soon as possible – see below. Don't let a waiting list put you off. Plot changes do happen throughout the growing year so if your name is on the list you won't miss out and may not have to wait as long as you might expect!

Polar Explorers children's summer holiday club


Children from Goldsworth Andrew's Park can sign up for two days of fun-filled, craftcrammed, bible-based activities this summer.
