The AGM of the GPCA was held on the 19th November 2025 covering a wide range of subjects. GPCA Community Trustee Bob Cowell welcomed everyone to the meeting.

The GPCA Trustees then gave an overview of the GPCA activities over the year, which included:

- Laying a wreath at the Remembrance Day service
- Supplying, erecting and decorating the Christmas tree in the shopping centre, with St Andrew's Church and Goldsworth Park Angling Club
- Meeting throughout the year with various members of Woking Borough Council and Surrey County Council
- Running 3 litter picks
- Running the refreshment stall for the Woking and Sam Beare Hospice Dragon Boat race day
- Sponsoring the children's rides at the Summer Fair organised by the Guides and St Andrew's Church
- Running a quiz – another is being arranged; and
- Providing entertainment at the Goldsworth Christmas market.

The Trustees would like to put on more events but require more support to be able to do so. Please contact Dueyna the GPCA Social Trustee on social@ourgoldsworthpark.org.uk if you can help.

The Treasurer's Report showed that the GPCA incurred a loss for the year ending 30th June 2025. The loss is down to the GPCA funding the fairground rides for the Goldsworth summer fair, sponsoring the bouncy castle at the Lakeview Community Fun Day, attending a First Aid course, purchase of seeds for the meadow plus a shortfall in advertising revenue in Goldsworth News mainly due to delay in invoicing.

Bob Challoner then spoke about what he had been going since resuming the role of Natural Goldsworth Park project manager. Bob informed he is re-establishing contact with Thames Water and has met with officials of Woking Borough Council. The Yellow Rattle seeding has had some success although the primary test will be in the spring. Reinstating the woodpiles is an aim for 2026. Fire lighting, litter in the

woods and cutting branches to make shelters was reported as being a concern.

Roger Westcott (Goldsworth Park Angling Club) spoke about activities supported by the club and about wildlife on Goldsworth Park Lake. The club has been operating for 11 years and continues to monitor water quality as part of lake maintenance. The most recent test was in July 2025 the results of which showed good water quality with no evidence of sewage. In recent years straw bales have been used to manage water quality however this has been found to not improve water quality so will cease. Alternatives are being explored in conjunction with Woking Borough Council. The trimming of branches will continue over the coming months with timing taking account of wildlife requirements. Roger will keep residents updated through Goldsworth News.

Roger closed with a request to visitors to the lake to cut down on feeding the wildlife.

As Celia announced that she is not seeking re-election as a Trustee at this AGM there was no requirement for any of the remaining 3 Trustees to seek re-election. Bob Cowell informed the meeting he will be standing down as a Trustee and not seeking re-election at the 2026 AGM. This currently leaves three GPCA Trustees which is the minimum requirement under the CIO rules. The Trustees informed the meeting that at least one new Trustee would be required at or before the 2026 AGM to replace Bob when he steps down.

A couple of items were raised under questions from the floor with the first covering use of the Community Fund. Councillor Martin Sullivan shared that several ideas were being considered including a new bench by the surgery, 2 benches by the playground and 2 benches in Sythwood plus an additional waste bin by the meadow. The possibility of Lidl opening a store on the Brockhill site was also raised. There was nothing to report as no approach has been made to Woking Borough Council for the Brockhill site.

With no further questions from the floor the meeting closed. Attendees were invited to join the Trustees for drinks and nibbles.

Natural Goldsworth Park Update



NGP's Project Manager, Bob Challoner, writes:

BIRD FLU

You may have seen recent reports of bird flu cases in the Southeast with several dead swans having been found at Windsor and Maidenhead, and several swans in those areas seen to be suffering symptoms which include:

- **Lethargy and weakness**
- **Loss of coordination/odd movement of the head/neck**
- **Bleeding from the eyes**
- **Spinning in circles**

Fortunately, we are yet to see any sickness amongst the Lake's waterfowl population, but we should all be aware of the risks of inadvertently transmitting the disease. Please ensure when feeding the birds that the food is well spread out to prevent overcrowding, wash footwear after visiting any waterway, and keep dogs on a lead or under close control.

If you happen across any dead birds please report to Woking Borough Council which is required to remove them and notify DEFRA on 03459 33 55 77 or visit the DEFRA website at <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/report-dead-wild-birds>. Sick or dead swans can also be reported to Swan Support on 07968 86 81 72.

NATURAL GOLDSWORTH PARK ACTIVITIES

I had hoped to arrange a residents' work party at the end of February/early March to tackle the Cherry Laurel in the woodland. Unfortunately, at the time of writing (end January) I have not been able to confirm suitable dates with the landowner, Thames Water, and sadly the response from NGP Facebook Group members has been disappointing. I will endeavour to set up at least one working party later this year.

Cherry Laurel is a large, invasive, fast-growing shrub which shades out other plants and due to its toxic nature, is of little ecological value. Removal will encourage greater plant diversity.

From the Lakeside



The Goldsworth Park Angling Club have been managing angling and helping to maintain and care for the lake and Brookwood ponds since 2015. This also includes their habitats and surrounding areas which involves undertaking a whole range of tasks in order to try to keep our park, lake and ponds a healthy, safe and tidy haven for us all to appreciate and enjoy.

As volunteers there are limitations as to what we can or cannot achieve such as large tree work or water control, fixing broken lights round the lake or repairing cracks in the pathways - that's down to our local authorities. However, we do report these kinds of issues as they arise. Having said that we do undertake much of the more day to day management including monitoring fish stocks, caring for the birdlife, trimming branches, tending reed beds, litter picking etc. In more recent times we have noted some changes in fish behaviour. Is there a problem with the lake that we need to understand? Is there something in the water we need to investigate? To do nothing was not option. We had been in contact with Thames Water to no avail so we took it upon ourselves to run some tests in agreement with WBC. So, over this last year or so we began making regular checks on water quality using specialist equipment capable of taking readings of water temperature, dissolved oxygen, ammonia levels, nitrates-nitrites etc. We also took both water and

silt samples from several areas of the lake for laboratory testing in order to try to understand how healthy the lake is and to check if the fish were OK.

Other questions to answer were: Is there any health risks that we should be aware of? What about the fish or the birds or all forms of life that rely on water? Is our lake in good order bearing in mind that it is at the end of the day a hole in the ground designed to take surface water, road run off as a flood defence for Goldsworth Park and the surrounding area?

I'm sure you will appreciate these tests came with considerable time and cost to the club. Our findings to date have proven to be most beneficial for us all, in that first and foremost the water offers NO risk to human health than any other open body of water - this is great news indeed. However, it was noted that alga levels were very high particularly in warmer weather and oxygen levels within the water were at times very low typically at night time which is detrimental to fish and invertebrate life. The silt samples did show high levels of phosphorus which may well be attributed to decaying organic matter such as leaf fall, plant life, etc. Also other materials from road run off were noted such as rubber, petroleum, some heavy metals which are to be expected plus rooting food stuffs.

So is there anything we can or should do to help alleviate some of the issues within our findings. The simple answer to that is yes. The club has made the

decision to cease placing some forty barley strew bails into the lake in order to help combat alga growth. Instead, we will use a liquid form of barley which will achieve the same goal. You may remember the floating island on the lake, at present not in use but not for much longer. We plan to convert it into an aeration station run by solar panels pumping oxygen throw air stones placed out in the most central part of the lake. It will be silent running and low maintenance yet a very efficient way of improving dissolved oxygen in water. We will also remove as much fallen debris on the water as is possible particularly in the autumn. As for what comes through the drainage system sadly that we cannot control but there is one more thing we can all do to help preserve our wonderful lake and that is and yes, I know I have mentioned it many times before is to stop feeding the wildfowl tons of bread. It has no nutritional value for the birds and is detrimental to the quality of the water. Out of interest our study showed quite clearly that phosphorus levels were found highest in the bay closest to the car park where most people feed the birds. Using small amounts of bird pellet will, I am sure, go a long way in keeping the birds and lake the healthier for it.

We hope you have found this of interest to the point that when visiting the lake or ponds you see us busying ourselves do stop and say "Hi" and if you have any questions please ask away.

Letter from a resident

GOLDSWORTH PARK AFTER THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

As a past Chair of the Goldsworth Park Community Association (GPCA), having spent nearly 30 years working in various capacities with the GPCA on behalf of the community, I am concerned about the impact on Goldsworth Park of the Local Government Reorganisation in Surrey.

You may be aware that Surrey County Council and all the Surrey Borough Councils are being disbanded and replaced with two unitary authorities – East Surrey and West Surrey on 1st April 2027. Woking will be in West Surrey and elections for the shadow West Surrey Council will be held on Thursday 7 May 2026. West Surrey Council will have 45 electoral Wards, a significant reduction on the present number, meaning wards will be larger than before and Goldsworth Park will be a casualty in this reorganisation.

For the last 10 years, Goldsworth Park has been a separate Ward with its own three Woking Borough Councillors. Surrey County Council retained the earlier arrangement where Goldsworth Park was split in two with half combined with Knaphill in the West and the other half with Horsell in the East. Under the new unitary West Surrey Council Goldsworth Park will lose its individuality when it is again split between Knaphill & West Goldsworth Ward and East Goldsworth & Horsell Village Ward.

The GPCA has always had positive relationships with both its

Woking Borough and Surrey County Councillors. The Surrey County Councillors, although each representing a large area, have worked together to respond favourably to requests for support from the GPCA. However, there are active Residents Associations in Horsell and Knaphill which will be promoting the needs of their communities and the GPCA, which seems to have very little support from the community now, may not be able to get its voice heard.

The Government wants the new unitary councils to give communities more say through local Neighbourhood Area Committees (NACs) bringing together local Councillors, the Voluntary Community Social Enterprise sector, health and police representatives, schools, businesses, and community groups, with the aim of dealing with local issues and discussing priorities. It is not clear how large these "Local Neighbourhood Areas" will be, but if they are based on Wards, the GPCA will be hard pressed to maintain its involvement in two Committees.

Goldsworth Park needs a strong and active Community Association to protect and promote its interests in the new unitary council. If you want Goldsworth Park to have the representation it deserves, don't be one of those people who says, "someone should do something about that"; step up to the mark and support the GPCA by offering your services – they are always looking for help.

Scouts launch new Squirrels group in Goldsworth Park

1st Goldsworth Park Scout Group has opened its first scouting section for children aged 4-6, called "Squirrels". Their group is called a "Squirrel Drey".

Like their older fellow scouts, Squirrels work on skills for life, completing four challenge badges and two or more additional activity badges in pursuit of their main award, the Chief Scout Acorn.

Our Squirrels had a busy first term: they met the local Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) and saw a police car, planted spring bulbs, made bird feeders, cooked bread twists on a campfire, and played lots of games. A new Explorer Scouts Unit in Goldsworth Park

Due to increased demand, Woking Explorer Scouts has launched a new Explorer Scout Unit called "Argonauts" in Goldsworth Park, for young people aged 14 to 17. Meeting in the Generation Centre, it is the first new Explorer Scout Unit in Woking since 2002.

Explorer Scouts provide adventure, teamwork and practical experiences that help young people build confidence and develop skills for life as they move towards adulthood.

The young people chose Argonauts as their unit's name, after the Argonauts of Greek mythology who sailed in the ship Argo to search for the Golden Fleece. The Explorers also designed a scarf for their Unit, choosing gold and blue with a navy border to reflect Goldsworth Park, the local lake and the Argonauts' adventurous spirit. One of the new Explorers said: "Choosing the name and designing the scarf ourselves made it feel like our Unit straight away."

We've already done loads of different activities, and it's been really fun getting to know people from other schools."

The Argonauts' autumn term was full of activity, including district competitions, community events and camps, volunteering for the RBL Poppy Appeal, attending the Remembrance Sunday event, and joining a large-scale spy-themed challenge that ended in an overnight stay at the Secret Nuclear Bunker in Kelvedon Hatch.

Through fun, challenge and adventure, Scouts offers a youth provision recognised worldwide. As opportunities for young people continue to grow, so too does the need for adult volunteers to support them.

Scouting in Woking has grown significantly over the past year and now supports six Explorer Scout Units, with around 160 Explorers across the district.

News from St Andrew's by Revd Scott Smith

'Are you the Swan man?'

I was hard at work in our church café when my quiet was interrupted. Taken a little by surprise, I looked up and answered, 'No, I'm the Vicar.' 'Oh,' came the reply, 'of which church?'

A little more surprised, I said, 'This one. The one you're standing in.'

Over the last three years, I have had a few conversations in a similar vein, with some people seemingly unaware that there is a parish church at the very heart of Goldsworth Park.

Other conversations have asked me who the 'Andy' is that our café is named after. I must admit that it took me over a year to work out that it's (now obviously) linked to St Andrew, and not the name of person who runs it... 'Loving God with all our heart and reflecting God's heart to Goldsworth Park and beyond,' is what St Andrew's is all about.

It's what St Andrew's has been about since 1977 when the church began meeting in a lounge and it's continued since 1988 when St Andrew's started meeting in its current building (just across from Waitrose). All of which is to say that, you may have noticed the new signs that have recently appeared on the church building, and which is the culmination of an eighteen-month project. Part of the aim of the project has been to ensure that people are aware that we are here, and especially to know that we are here for all the community of Goldsworth Park.



You'll know if you glance at the 'Dates for your diary' pages of this magazine, that there is always a lot going on in the life of St Andrew's, much of it community-focused, all of it looking to reflect God's heart to Goldsworth Park and beyond.

We have groups for all ages, from our 'Bump & Beyond' and Toddler ministries, to our Senior's events, live music evenings as well as our café space which opens every Tuesday-Thursday morning and hosts our Art and Craft groups. Goldsworth Park, and half of Surrey, will be voting for a brand-new West Surrey Council on Thursday 7 May. This new council will stretch from Staines to Farnham. It will be responsible for the services currently delivered by Woking and other borough councils and Surrey County Council.

If you live to the West of Goldsworth Park you will be in Knaphill and Goldsworth Park. To the East you will be part of Goldsworth East and Horsell Village. Each of these areas will elect 2 councillors.

Brockhill has now sadly been demolished but there has not been

a planning application from Lidl.

Woking is currently procuring a new waste contract as the existing one runs out before the new council would be able to set one up. Our waste will still be collected in the same way, even though new government rules on recycling start in April. Woking already collects all that is required, but we don't separate paper and card from other dry recycling. As a change would be too costly at this stage we can carry on as we are.

A personal view

Imagine this: it's peaceful outside as the sky brightens in the east to herald a new day. Suddenly a voice to your left shouts "Get outa my space! Oi, you! Scarper!"

Meanwhile to your right a solo voice shouts seductively: "Come on girls, I'm the guy you want – handsome, hunky and hot! And you can rely on me to help raise your family!" In front of you numerous voices call excitedly: "We're over here – come and join us!"

That's the essence of bird-speak! Birdsong is one of the most beautiful and awe-inspiring parts of springtime. Each species has its own sounds, songs and rules: robins sing to talk to other robins, not to blackbirds. But to us birdsong just sounds musical, captivating and uplifting.

Some of what we call birdsong is done to be sociable with other birds of their species (so "birds of a feather flock together"). And there are the tweets, trills, chirps, quacks and honks that birds make throughout the year during feeding, foraging and flight, or when a flock settles down for the night.

However, birdsong's main function during the breeding season – late January until July – is for the singer to be a successful breeder either by marking a territory or calling to attract a mate. It's when they sing the longest.

Singing requires effort and energy, so they sing at dawn and dusk when the air is often much stiller and sounds carry further. With less background noise early on, their song can carry up to twenty times as far.

While many birds sing throughout the day, it's as the morning light breaks that many different birds perform together. It's what we call the dawn chorus. Our resident birds are in song by mid-March, then millions of migrant birds add their songs as they arrive here from Africa for the summer.

The dawn chorus isn't a free-for-all, as different species know when to join in the symphony. The first start singing about an hour before sunrise. Act one is performed by wrens, dunnocks and robins – the earliest to warm up. The stars of act two are blackbirds, song-thrushes and skylarks.

Act three is presented by the chiffchaff, chaffinch, wood pigeon and collared dove. Finally, act four features the blue tit, long tailed tit, great tit, goldcrest and tree sparrow.

There's also a chorus at dusk, but it's much quieter: some birds, including blue tits and tree sparrows, prefer to sing at that time of day.

Sunday 4th May is International Dawn Chorus Day when the public is encouraged to rise early to listen to bird song. Ideally

you would be ready with a cup of something warm around 5am to catch the first birdsong. It reaches its peak by around 6:30am.

It's easy to enjoy one of nature's wonderful free shows: just open your window at around dawn, especially from April onwards, and listen to the glorious dawn chorus. It doesn't matter where you happen to be or if you can't identify the birds taking part – it's a beautiful, uplifting sound!


